## For the good of your dog

## A message to all families

We strongly suggest that, for the good of your dog, ONE family member elects to train the dog during classes on Saturday afternoons.

The reason behind this is that consistency is an important key to successful learning. This is especially true when the dog is young or is learning new exercises.

Every person handles the dog in a slightly different way, has slightly different voice tones, slightly different hand signals, slightly different tolerance levels \& these, combined, can confuse a dog working in an already fairly stressful environment.

The family member, elected as the main trainer, then has the task of training \& convincing the rest of the family to use the same cue words, voice tones \& signals all the time.

## Promotion testing

In case of a family membership, each family member, who takes the dog into class, will be required to pass the promotion test with the family dog.
For example, if husband \& wife take turns in class with the dog, they must both pass the test with the dog - another good reason for just one handler to do all of the training in class!

We have introduced this so each person fully understands our training methods, is using the same cue words \& hand signals \& feels competent \& comfortable when taking part in each lesson.

## Talk about training!! How about this!

 Helpful hints for handlers \& dogs

## Common things that handlers are often unaware of

- Working with the dog on a tight lead
- Pulling on the lead to stop dog
- Jerking the lead instead of encouraging the dog towards your left leg when heeling
- Jerking lead as a cue for dog to 'sit', instead of correcting with hands or using treat
- Stepping off before giving the cue to 'heel'
- Handler not concentrating on dog
- Leaning over your dog as it comes in from 'come' or recall
- Constantly 'chattering' to the dog or repeating cue word endlessly i.e. 'sit' 'sit' 'sit'. Remember use cue once only, then show the dog what you want (hands or treat).


## Walking at heel

## Dog - should

- be working happily \& with enthusiasm, wanting to be with you because 'this is fun'!!
- have their right shoulder beside your left leg
- be working on a loose lead
- be watching you \& listening to you
- be waiting for your next move or word cue.


## You - should

- maintain a relaxed posture \& be happy - don't walk like a soldier on parade
- step out (don't dawdle) so your dog maintains concentration \& interest
- make every move \& every cue word exactly the same every time
- keep lead loose - have food in your left hand \& reward every wanted/good response
- have the lead in your right hand, so your left hand is free to reward \& you can show the dog where they should be
- for heeling - step off on left foot
- for stay positions - step off on right foot
- use the 'watch' or 'look' cue to get attention before \& during all exercises so the dog's focus remains on you
- not continually nag by using dog's name without also giving a cue word. (NB. The dog's name doesn't mean heel, sit, drop, come, etc!)
- reward \& praise often - remember, in the early stages, 6-8 steps of good heeling or a really square sit need LOTS of praise \& a jackpot reward
- make all turns $\left(90^{\circ} \& 180^{\circ}\right)$ slowly - give your dog time to understand what is about to happen \& to stay with you.

The stationary positions - sit, down \& stand

## Dog - should

- be parallel with you, beside your left leg \& facing in the same direction
- remain in that position until you give the next cue word
- be watching you \& listening to you
- be waiting for your next move or word cue.


## You - should

- keep your attention on your dog so you can stop them moving BEFORE it happens!
- reassure, praise \& reward often
- not try to step more than 30 cms away until your dog is really steady - you will be teaching your dog they can get up whenever it suits them \& that you are not serious about wanting them to stay in that position until the next cue word.


## The come \& recall

## Dog - should

- understand what the 'come' cue means \& that it always produces praise \& a reward
- see you as more interesting than other distractions such as dogs, birds, smells, etc
- wait (not break the stay) at the point you choose to leave them at for a recall.


## You - should

- alert your dog by using their name before you start to move backwards in the 'come' or call them to you in the recall.
- not 'reel in' your dog - in other words don't pull them in with the lead, encourage them to come to you because 'this is fun!'
- have a few reward treats in your hand \& give them as soon as the dog reaches you
- in the recall - take hold of the dog's collar each time they reach you so they don't learn to grab the reward treat \& run off - hand on collar, food in mouth
- reward again for a sit in front.

Luring is allowed in Advanced Puppy \& Advanced First Class, especially when you are teaching your dog new exercises, but it should gradually be reduced in preparation for promotion to Second Class.

## Test for promotion to Second Class

The test is done on a one-to-one basis by a senior Club Instructor.
Check your green NSDTC Information Manual for what is involved in the test.

## What should we use as training treats?

Training treats should be soft, tasty \& small (no bigger than your little finger nail)
We recommend cold cooked beef or chicken sausages, cold meat, cabanossi, devon or chicken roll, cooked chicken thighs (they don't shred like BBQ'd chicken) \& a limited amount of cheddar cheese.
We don't recommend ham, pork or bacon (all too fatty \& salty for dogs).
Dried liver or chicken treats are not good as training treats as the dogs stop to chew them \& normal kibble is 'that boring stuff I get every day'!

Good work deserves really good reward treats \& plenty of them!!

## After completing the basics = what else can I do with my dog?

Your options include obedience, rally obedience, agility trialling, flyball, herding, earth dog tests, dances with dogs, endurance tests, etc.

## Basic obedience is the essential bottom-line for everything

Basic cue words include heel, sit, drop, stay \& come


Heel - means walking quietly \& steadily beside your left leg at normal, slow \& fast paces
The dog stays in the heel position as you move in any direction



Sit, drop \& stand. The dog is beside your left leg

Come when called. The dog is asked to sit \& stay. The handler walks a short distance away \& turns to face their $\operatorname{dog} \&$ halts.
The handler then says 'come' \& at the same time gives the 'come' hand signal. The dog returns to the handler \& sits in front


Stay steadily in a sit \& down position when in a line of dogs (group stays)

In Advanced First \& Advanced Puppy classes you will find your dog's concentration span is often very short \& you may only get a limited response - a few steps of good heeling, a quick sit or down then the dog is distracted by something much more interesting \& appears to forget all they've ever learned \& goes back to just being 'a dog' - pulling, jumping \& generally fooling around!
Don't despair - with many, many short training sessions the wanted behaviours will become the norm \& you'll wonder why you ever thought you'd never succeed.
In the early stages you need to practise the basic exercises in quiet surroundings with the least number of distractions. Sometimes your dog will be distracted during class (it's so....... exciting!) but remember, in class we are really training \& showing you how to train your dog.

Once you have the basics in place, it is time to start practising in other places. During your daily walks, on the footpath outside the shopping centre, at the sports ground, when you have visitors, during the family BBQ, etc.
When you reach 2nd or 3rd Class you'll be encouraged to compete in the Ku-ring-gai

K9 Award. This is an in-house test of basic manners \& obedience. We hold the test twice each year (read about the Award in your Club Handbook).
Once your dog is reasonably competent in the 3rd Class exercises \& your dog is 12 months old, you are ready to start agility. Agility training takes place from 9.30-12 noon on Saturdays. You will be shown how to train your dog to negotiate jumps, tunnels, the table (where the dog has to wait for a few seconds in the middle of the course), the A frame, the dog walk \& the seesaw. Sounds simple, but some of the obstacles have special requirements - such as contact points which the dog's feet must touch on the way up or down the obstacle.
It's lots of fun \& most dogs absolutely love it!! It's also very good exercise for humans!
Once you are in 4th Class you will have a number of options -

- to continue training your dog so you are ready to trial at the CCD obedience level \& in Rally Obedience
- to continue with obedience training just because you \& your dog enjoy it
- or to join the Social Novice Class where you \& your dog will participate in some general obedience work \& some agility. Every so often a session introducing you to tracking may be included.

Every second week, one of our instructors is available to teach you the basics of flyball. In this sporting activity, the dogs run over 3 very low jumps, step on a special dispenser box which releases a tennis ball which they catch \& then they return over the jumps to their handler. Again it's a lot of fun \& the dogs become really excited \& thoroughly enjoy the game.
We encourage you all to stay with the club beyond the first basic classes. You can expect to be in Advanced First \& Advanced Puppy classes for at least 4 weeks, before you will be ready to be tested for promotion to 2nd Class.
Promotion to 2nd, 3rd \& 4th Class requires you to pass an easy, one-on-one test. Ask your instructors to tell you exactly what to expect in each test.
It is normal to stay at each level for a minimum of 4 weeks as there are new exercises to be learned \& you \& your dog need time to perfect these.
Promotion beyond 4th Class is by achievement of obedience titles.

# A Healthy Dog is <br> a Happy Dog 

## Should I have my dog desexed \& at what age?

It is wise \& responsible to desex (spey) your bitch or castrate (neuter) your dog unless you intend to show them in breed competitions or are a registered breeder.

Most vets recommend the best age is between 5-7 months, that is before the dog has reached sexual maturity. Please discuss this with your own vet.

## Why desex your dog?

- To prevent the production of unwanted puppies. Just visit the website of the RSPCA or other animal rescue sites \& see how many unwanted dogs are awaiting adoption. It's worth remembering many of these dogs will, ultimately, be euthanased
- Desexing has a calming effect on both sexes. In the male dog it helps to reduce the roaming habit \& tends to prevent mounting other dogs or visitors \& 'humping' cushions!
- Desexing is a less complicated procedure in young animals so the risks are fewer
- A bitch will never come into season. This can be a difficult time as you have to keep prospective Romeos away \& clean up a messy discharge in the house!
- Desexing of the bitch prevents mammary tumours \& the life threatening uterine infection Pyometra in the older bitch
- Castration of the male eliminates the risk of testicular cancer, common in the older male \& helps to prevent prostate problems in the older dog
- Council registration fees are reduced for a desexed bitch or castrated male.
- Desexing/castration will not cause excessive weight gain - this only occurs when the dietary calorie intake is in excess of the energy expended.
- It will not change the dog's inherent temperament. They are still exactly the same excepting they are not able to add to the long list of unwanted dogs.
- There is no logical reason to allow a bitch to have a litter - it will not improve her temperament \& dogs do not have emotional 'hang ups' like humans!
- Allowing children to see the birth of a litter is not a good enough reason to bring unwanted creatures into the world. There are many good videos \& DVD's available showing the birth of a litter of puppies. Much cheaper, less time consuming \& a much better option.

## Hazardous things we can avoid



## Heliotrope Available in white or purple varieties

A popular plant found in gardens \& in pots on patios It is hardy plant that seeds itself readily, so watch out for seedlings.
Some dogs like to nibble the leaves.
It is highly toxic \& can cause total liver destruction.


## Brunsfelsia (Yesterday, today \& tomorrow plant)

The foliage is dense \& medium green in colour.
The young leaves are often purplish in cool weather.
The flowers are very sweetly perfumed. When they first open they are a violet colour, fading to lavender blue \& then white, with the three colours present on the bush at the same time.
The brown berries have been known to poison dogs.
Symptoms include fever, vomiting, muscle tremors, staggering \& seizures.

## White cedar (Melia azedarach)

This deciduous tree grows to around 15 m tall. It has a spreading canopy, pale lilac flowers in spring \& green berries ripening to brownish-yellow.
The fruit is highly for poisonous dogs. Ripe fruit is more poisonous than green fruit. The leaves \& seeds of the white cedar are natural insecticides

Symptoms of poisoning include digestive problems, as well as nervous system \& kidney malfunction.


## Scary!! Dogs travelling with their head out of car windows

A common scenario -
The car with a beautiful dog hanging his head out of the window. His head was nearly hit by a closely overtaking truck.
Needless to say he was close to incurring a bad head injury or worse still - death.

At the other end of the scale, he is liable to sustain eye or ear damage from dust or debris.

## Ingredients

2 cups of flour
3 tbs vegetable oil
1 cup of wheat germ (or cornmeal if wheat allergies are a problem)
1 egg, lightly beaten
1/2 cup chicken broth
2 tbs parsley
1 cup cooked \& chopped chicken liver

## Directions

Combine flour \& wheat germ
In separate bowl, beat egg with oil, then add broth \& parsley
Mix well
Add the dry ingredients a little at a time, stirring well
Fold in chicken livers. Dough will be firm
Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface \& knead briefly
Roll out 1cm thick \& cut into shapes
Place on greased cookie sheet 2.5 cm apart
Bake at $200^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ for 15 minutes or until firm
Store in refridgerator

## NSDTC Inc VACCINATION POLICY <br> Up-dated September 2010

NSDTC requires a minimum C3 (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination administered after the age of 12 weeks for all puppies less than 12 months old. Please Note. A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccinations is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.

- All adult dogs (over 12 months old) joining or renewing, must have had at least a C3 vaccination administered after 12 months of age. Triennial (3-yearly) C3 vaccination is considered acceptable thereafter.
- Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 4 years that have not had aC 3 vaccination in the preceding 3 years must be referred to the Club Vet officer or official nominee.
- Veterinary certificates showing adequate antibody titres* to distemper, hepatitis \& parvovirus will be accepted by NSDTC for all adult dogs as long as they are dated within the preceding 12 months.
*Adequate antibody titres for distemper, hepatitis \& parvovirus are considered to be >1:20
- As Bordetella \& Parainfluenza (both agents causing canine cough) are not generally life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations would be optional, but recommended \& owners are reminded these may be required by boarding kennels.
- All vaccination \& antibody titre certificates must be signed by a registered veterinary surgeon.
- Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.


## PARKING

## - Please park on the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground or near the picnic area beside the Douglas Pickering Pavilion.

- The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for 'on duty' Club Members who need to leave their dogs in the car, carry equipment, etc. Thank you.


## CLUB \& USE of GROUND GUIDELINES

These guidelines are for the benefit of all members \& the general public who use St Ives Showground.

- All dogs must be on lead during club training times (except when off lead work is directed by an instructor during class).
- Dog droppings must be cleaned up \& placed in a bin.
- Each week pay your $\$ 5.00$ ground fee at the Clubhouse. Collect your ticket \& hand it to your instructor at start of class.
- Always wear your name tag.
- The dog rings are a leash free area EXCEPT on Saturdays.
- The main oval may be used for leash free exercise, so long as no other organised event is taking place.
