# Nothing In Life Is Free (NILF) Program

This program has been very useful in training dogs that have decided they will do as they please regardless of your wishes.

If you find yourself with a dog that continually gets on your couch or bed \& refuses to get off or insists on being petted when IT wishes to be petted, rather than when you decide to pet it, this program may very well help you greatly! The same goes for those 'headstrong dogs' that flatly refuse to come when you call or defend their food dish \& toys from you \& other humans in your household. 'NILF' can help. It is not a cure-all that will solve every behaviour problem but it will help your canine companion to behave better in your family 'pack' because it trusts \& accepts you as 'the pack leader' \& is confident knowing its place in your family.

How to practice 'NILF'
Using positive reinforcement methods, teach your dog a few commands \&/or tricks. The basic sit, down \& stay are important commands \& of course you can add shake, speak \& rollover which are fun tricks to teach your dog. Training your dog also has the pleasant side effect of creating a stronger bond between canine \& master.
Once your dog knows a few commands, you can begin to practice 'NILF'. Before you give your dog anything (food, a treat, a walk, a pat on the head) it must first perform one of the commands it has learned.

For example:

- It's walk time. Dog must sit until you've put the lead on.
- It's dinner time. Dog must sit \& stay until you've put the bowl down \& said 'OK'.
- It's time to play a game of fetch or tug-o-war? Dog must sit \& shake hands each time before you throw the toy.
- It's treat time. Dog must sit \& perform one of the fun tricks you've taught him.
- Dog wants a belly rub. Dog must lie down \& rollover before being petted.

Make sure your dog knows the commands well \& understands what you want before you begin practicing 'NILF'.
Don't give your dog what it wants until it does what you want. Being consistent is EXREMELY IMPORTANT!

If he refuses to perform the command, walk away, come back a few minutes later \& start the process over again. If your dog refuses to obey the command, be patient \& remember that eventually he will have to obey your command in order to get what he wants (think of the dog as a headstrong Teen, rebelling). Eventually their desire for whatever it is they want, will outweigh their desire to rebel \& they'll remember they have to earn their reward.

The benefits of this program:
Most dogs assume a neutral (Omega) or submissive role toward people, but some dogs will challenge their owners for dominance. Requiring a dominant dog to work for everything it wants is a safe \& non-confrontational way to establish control. This is understood by the canine brain because of its ingrained desire to understand its 'pack status'.
Dogs who may never display aggressive behaviour such as growling, snarling, snapping or otherwise acting out in a physical manner, may still manage to attempt to subtly manipulate you. These dogs may display affectionate, though 'pushy' behaviour, such as nudging your hand to be petted or 'worming' their way on to the furniture in order to be close to you.

The 'NILF" technique gently reminds even the subtly 'pushy' dog that he must abide by your rules.
Obeying commands helps build a fearful or timid dog's confidence; having a strong leader \& knowing its place in the 'pack' helps to make the submissive dog feel more secure.
The 'NILF" technique works because animals, like dogs, that naturally live in packs, establish a social structure within the pack commonly called a dominance hierarchy. This serves to maintain order, reduce conflict \& promote cooperation among pack members.
In order for your home to be a safe \& happy place for pets \& people, it's essential that your dog knows ALL humans in the household (young \& old) assume the highest positions in the dominance hierarchy. Practicing NILF effectively \& gently communicates to your dog that its position in the hierarchy is subordinate to yours \& the rest of your human family. Because children are small \& can get down on the dog's level to play, dogs often consider them to be playmates, rather than superiors. With the supervision of an adult, it's a good idea to encourage children in the household to also practice NILF with the family dog.

## A Minute on Your Mutt

Dogs \& children can share a truly wonderful relationship but NEVER leave your dog $\&$ a child under the age of 10 years unsupervised.
It is often the family dog that causes injury to a child, but it is NOT always the dog's fault. Children can often be very cruel \& threatening to a dog even though it's unintentional.
Please ensure children

- do not tease a dog
- do not pull, pinch, poke or handle a dog too roughly
- do not put their fingers or foreign objects into a dog's ears, mouth, eyes or other 'private' places.


Children should be taught not to scream, wave their hands \& arms \& run madly around a dog as this may excite the dog, resulting in jumping, growling \& nipping \& can even end up with the dog attacking the child (ie the dog's prey drive kicks in $\&$ he catches his 'prey'). Teach children to leave their dog alone when he's sleeping or eating.

Sophie, a 54 kilogram gentle giant, is part of the new Animal Assisted Therapy rehabilitation program at The Children's Hospital Westmead. As a hospital spokesperson said 'it is difficult to explain to a four year old that you want them to walk up \& down a room four or five times, whereas if you have a dog there \& you say come on, let's walk with Sophie, they'll happily walk with the dog'.
Sue, a volunteer with the Delta Society Australia, visits the hospital weekly with Sophie.

## Tips for Obedience Training

To many dogs, the command 'come' means 'quick, run the other way!' There are countless examples of how the owner trains the dog not to come by unintentionally punishing the dog when it does come. Every time the dog is called to engage in an activity that the dog doesn't enjoy, he is learning that the command 'come' is bad news. The owner should never call the dog to come $\&$ then give him a bath, clip his nails or confine him. Even if the owner's planned activity is not unpleasant for the dog, just the fact that it isn't as much fun as the activity the dog is currently engaged in is enough for the dog to choose not to obey. It's better for the owner to just go \& get the dog for these activities rather than ruin an otherwise rapid recall. Some owners intentionally punish their dog when it comes. Often this is done when the dog has misbehaved (especially chewed something or soiled in the house). The owner shouts 'Come here. Bad dog!' After the dog has been scolded once or twice when she obeys \& comes to the owner, not surprisingly, she will be reluctant come when called next time.

Dogs are always learning whether we intend to teach them or not. Formal training sessions are usually short \& infrequent compared to the day to day \& minute to minute training (or more appropriately - untraining) we do with our dogs. In order to correct this type of problem the owner must first be aware of how he or she is unintentionally training undesirable behaviours in the dog. One or two instances of 'punishing' the dog for coming when called can undermine weeks \& weeks of formal training. Owners must learn to incorporate positive training into the dog's life \& daily routine. Until the dog is reliably trained to come when called, he should not be let off leash.

The average owner who attends a training class with his or her dog practises the exercises at home on the average of 5 minutes a day. An exceptional owner practises perhaps 15 minutes a day. What happens with the dog the other 23 hours 45 minutes each day? Every time the dog \& owner interact, the dog is learning something even though the owner may not be intentionally trying to teach the dog anything. Dogs are always learning.

## Basic Come When Called Training

As soon as your dog says 'Yes, yes! I'm hungry, I'll do anything for that food' then you're ready to begin. Introduce the simple recall by giving the dog a couple of nuggets of her dinner for free, then quickly back up a few feet \& say 'come'. Hold the food in an outstretched hand at the dog's nose level. Praise the dog all the time while she approaches \& give the food as soon as she arrives. Once the dog comes readily, add a sit to the end of the recall \& take hold of the dog's collar before giving the food. Many dogs will come \& sit, then duck or run away to avoid being touched. They will not allow themselves to be touched because past experience has shown them that this usually means bad news (from the dog's point of view, not yours).

## More Training Exercises

Now that the dog understands the basics of the exercise, it is time to make training even more fun. Perform the To \& Fro \& Hide \& Seek (described below) exercises between meals with your dog's favourite treats. Again, be sure the dog shows interest in the treat you're using. Use miniscule pieces - this is a treat, not a meal. One centimetre square pieces of chicken, cheese or liver are ideal. In other words, real food, not boring kibble. The better the reward, the quicker the dog learns \& the longer the dog retains what she has learned.
A very simple, enjoyable training exercise is a To \& Fro recall. Two or more people should
stand ten metres or so apart. One person calls the dog to come $\&$ instructs her to sit-stay. 7 Then the other person calls the dog to come \& rewards her. Practice this exercise in the house \& yard. Most dogs love this exercise \& in exuberant anticipation of the commands, may madly rush back \& forth, like a deranged yo-yo. To control this the person who asked the dog to sit may gently restrain her by holding her collar until she is called. Only the person who calls the dog is allowed to give a treat. We don't want the dog to think that all she has to do is charge up to someone $\&$ they will automatically dispense food.
When the dog catches on to the game of To \& Fro, then the human participants can begin to spread further apart turning the To \& Fro recall into a game of Hide \& Seek. Two or more people begin in the centre room of the house. Each time after they have called the dog to come, they go further away from the place they started. As the game progresses, eventually one person will be in the master bedroom, the second person in the guest room \& the third in the kitchen, etc. The dog does not simply run up to the person calling, he has to find that person first. This game is an especially good reinforcer because not only does it appeal to many of the dog's natural instincts, but it also associates the word 'come' with the owner \& fun instead of dread.

## Random Recalls \& Other Training Motivators

There are times when we know the dog will come, ie when the owner says, 'Do you want to go for a walk?' or 'Ride in the car?' or 'Where's your ball?' Many dogs come running to the owner just upon hearing car keys jingle or when the door where the leash is kept is opened or the cupboard that holds the treats is opened. Periodically \& randomly throughout the day, happily herald such events with the cheerful announcement 'come'. For example before giving any clues that a walk is being offered, call the dog to come. If she comes, hold out the leash \& ask her to sit, put on the leash \& go out for a walk. If she does not come, pick up the leash, waggle it around, put it away \& ignore the dog. She will probably regard you suspiciously, perhaps thinking 'How come my owner picked up my leash \& now we are not going for a walk?' The next 'come' usually produces an immediate response. With enough repetition your dog will think 'I'm not sure what those words mean, but whenever I hear them I better hurry over to my owner as quickly as possible because something terrific is going to happen'.

## Distraction Training

Don't let a fun activity such as running free \& playing with other dogs become a distraction to training. Instead, use it as a reward. Show the dog that if she comes when called, she will receive plentiful praise, a food treat $\&$ then be allowed to resume her play session. Try to be a part of your dog's good times, so that she learns it is not the end of the fun just because you tell her to 'come'. When you first take the recall training exercises outside, practice in areas with the least amount of distractions. Begin with the dog on a long leash. It's absolutely essential that you are able to enforce your command if the dog refuses to obey. Don't allow your dog to ignore you. If you call a couple of times $\&$ the dog ignores you, use the long leash to make the dog come. It will take many repetitions of 'come' during play before the dog is convinced that its freedom is not going to end just because the owner has called. Gradually add more distractions only when the dog succeeds with minimal distractions. When you find you no longer have to enforce your command, then it is time to try the exercises off leash. If at any time the dog regresses, simply go back to square one \& begin again. Don't take the dog back to the off leash park again until you have done some retraining. In most cases, all it takes is for the dog to get away with disobeying once \& the dog realizes that he can do it again \& again.

It's a good idea to practice all these exercises at every opportunity as you want to maintain the highest level of obedient behaviour \& prevent bad habits from creeping in.

## Cocoa shell mulch is lethal for dogs

NB. Cocoa Mulch is sold by garden supply stores in Australia.

The following warning has been issued by Ali Taylor, Head of Welfare, Battersea Dogs Home in the UK.
Cocoa mulch supplied by 'Target' is sold as a garden mulch. However following several dog fatalities over the last 2-3 weeks please check you haven't used it in your garden.
It contains the ingredient 'Theobromine' which is lethal to dogs \& cats who unfortunately like to eat the mulch because of its chocolatey smell.
The labelling information is apparently dubious \& does not fully warn of this danger.

## Potty Training

Gael Goldsack found this in a Bernese Mountain Dog newsletter \& thought it interesting.
Riley is only 4.5 months - she's probably not going to make it through the night. A general rule of thumb is this - it is reasonable to expect your puppy to hold it for approx one hour longer than her age in months. With this formula you should probably potty her just before bedtime \& then plan on setting your alarm to get her out about 5 to 6 hours later. Which, if you put her to bed around 10.00 pm would occur near 3:30 am... think she's telling you something?

## Excerpts from Chip In - Information for Dog Owners in NSW www.dlg.nsw.gov.au

The Companion Animal Act 1998 was introduced in NSW on 1.7.99 to protect pets, people \& the wider community.
Microchipping \& Registration is a two part process that requires dog owners to

1. Have their animals implanted with a microchip from the time they are 12 weeks of age, at point of sale or change of ownership (whichever occurs first).
2. Register their animals with their NSW local council by 6 months of age.

Please note: Your dog is required by law, when in a public place, to have a collar around its neck with a tag attached that shows the dog's name \& the address or phone number of the dog's owner.

## Updating Your Information

When you become the owner of a dog either by purchasing the animal or being given the pet, ensure that the previous owner or breeder sends the local council a completed \& signed change of owner form.
If you sell or give away a dog it is your responsibility as the 'old' owner to update the new owner's details on the Companion Animal register at your local council, otherwise penalties may apply. You should also notify council when any of your animals have died.
What to do when your dog is missing
Contact your local council \& pound (\& local vets) as soon as possible.

This should stop mass production of unwanted animals (by backyard breeders) to be sold through pet shops, newspapers etc. De-sexing at point of sale will be mandatory as will better education on responsible pet ownership.

Maricopa County was spending $\$ 18$ million a year on stray animals, like cats \& dogs. Sheriff Joe offered to take the department over \& the County Supervisors agreed.
The animal shelters are now all staffed \& operated by prisoners. They feed \& care for the strays. Every animal in his care is taken out \& walked twice daily. He now has prisoners who are experts in animal nutrition \& behaviour. They give great classes for anyone who'd like to adopt an animal. He has literally taken stray dogs off the street, given them to the care of prisoners \& had them place in dog shows.
The best part? His budget for the entire department is now under $\$ 3$ million.
Teresa \& I adopted a Weimaraner from a Maricopa County shelter two years ago. He was neutered \& current on all shots, in great health \& even had a microchip inserted the day we got him. It cost us $\$ 78$.

The prisoners get the benefit of about $\$ 0.28$ an hour for working, but most would work for free, just to be out of their cells for the day. Most of Sheriff Joe's budget is for utilities, building maintenance, etc. He pays the prisoners out of the fees collected for adopted animals.

Happy animals, much happier prisoners!!

## NSDTC Vaccination Policy

- NSDTC Inc requires a minimum C3 (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination after the age of 12 weeks for all puppies less than $\mathbf{1 2}$ months old.
- All dogs joining or renewing that are 12 months to 3 years of age must have had at least a C 3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months.
- Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 3 years who have not had a C3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months must be referred to the Club Veterinary Officer or nominee with their most recent vaccination certificate or letter of exemption from their vet.
- As Bordetella and Parainfluenza are not normally life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations are optional but recommended and owners are reminded that these will be required if the dog is to be boarded in kennels.
- All vaccination certificates must be signed by a registered veterinary surgeon.
- Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.

REMEMBER. A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccination is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.

## PARKING

- Parking for Club Members who are not instructing or doing other club related duties is to the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground.
- The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for "on duty" Club Members who need to leave their dogs, carry equipment, etc. Thank you.
