

Puppy Pages

Resource guarding

Preventing resource guarding is easy if you start early enough. Food & toys are the most common resources guarded by pet dogs.

Food guarding usually occurs because the dog thinks they need to protect a vital resource. It is a natural & normal behaviour but one which can & should be, eliminated in a pet dog.

Dogs that have been hungry at some point in their lives are more prone to food guarding than those that have always enough to eat.

To prevent food guarding you need to teach your puppy that a hand approaching a food dish is not coming to take the food away, but instead is bringing something more appetising to eat. Once a puppy has learned this, they will welcome you rather than try to keep you away.

Never become aggressive yourself in response to food guarding or you will teach your puppy to become aggressive too & the pup may eventually become dangerous when eating.

Try some of these tips at mealtimes-

Call your puppy to you at mealtime, place their dinner on the floor, squat down beside them & as they begin to eat, gently stroke & touch them all over, talking quietly while doing this. Begin on their back & side, progressing slowly towards their head. Stroke their ears & underneath their neck. If the pup shows signs of anxiety, slow down & distract them again with a few special titbits.

Take small pieces of food that are more appetising than their ordinary food (eg chicken, cabanossi, cheese) & hold them in front of your puppy's nose as they are eating. Allow them to eat these tasty titbits from your hand (do this 3 or 4 times at each meal).

Place your hand in the puppy's food bowl with a tasty titbit in it. As the puppy starts to sniff at your hand, open your hand (palm up) & allow them to eat the titbit from your hand. Dig around in their food bowl & give them another piece of tasty food that you have hidden. Do this a couple of times each meal, then leave them alone to eat their meal in peace.

Do this every day until they start to wag their tail & look up from the food bowl to see what else is on offer as you approach. At this stage you can occasionally remove the bowl from your pup while they are eating, place some tasty titbit in the bowl, then return the bowl telling them they are a good dog & to eat.

For toy guarding try these tips

The toys used when you play with your dog are **yours** (not the dog's). Therefore you own the resource & are happy to share it when it suits you!.

To get your pup to give up a toy (&/or bring it back to you) have another 'swap' toy in your hand.

Get their attention by waving or squeaking the 'swap' toy & as soon as the pup drops the first one, give or throw him the 'swap'. Remember to praise when your pup drops the toy. You can also swap a food treat for a toy. Ask your dog to 'give' & immediately they let go of the toy, praise them & give them a couple of treats. Then throw them the toy again. Keep repeating the process.

Slowly decrease the distance from you that is acceptable before the pup gets their 'swap'. The final goal is to have them put the toy in your hand before the treat or swap is given.

Things dogs love (& humans don't understand!) Thanks to Gael Goldsack

Leaving the toilet bowl lid down. Humans just don't understand that the water is cold, fresh & always tastes better there. For the little dogs that have never been able to 'reach' this delightful experience – you don't know what you are missing.

Not sharing in the fruits of your labour. I don't mean 'fruit' actually. I mean that thick beautiful, steak you cooked to such aromatic perfection. We're all part of the pack, right? Why am I not getting my share?

Not understanding my behaviour. Okay, so I like to greet strangers by leaping on them. I like to chase my tail by that lead crystal vase you call an heirloom. I'm not misbehaving; I'm a dog for crying out loud. It's all good & like shadow chasing, helps build eye-to-paw coordination.

Bathing. What is with the daily bath 'thing' that humans do? Why do they inflict that obscenity upon me on occasion? Just when I think I am smelling fine, they bathe me. I really don't understand. I'm only going to go out & roll in 'something' again. They just don't appreciate the effort it takes to get that perfect doggie odour.

Being away. I love attention & being around people, noise & excitement. When you are away, at work, or running errands ... this is time away from me. Don't you know? It is ALL about me. Your life should revolve around me & I can make you regret leaving me behind....

Nail trims. They are MY nails – I spend lots of time growing them & here they come again touching my feet. I hate that!

Not letting me chase the possum. They torment me by placing a 'glass wall' between me & lots of critters outside. How annoying. All I want to do is 'play with them. The other thing they do is restrain me with this thing called the leash. I want to run forward & I'm pulled back. If they can't keep up, they should just let me go. What is a dog to do?

Not letting me at the postman. This is so unfair. I wait all day for the postman & finally he comes. The anticipation is great. Then, they hold me back. Tell me to be quiet. They don't appreciate the fact that the postman comes most days & I single-handedly scare him away. My bravery & courage are unappreciated. How annoying.

When my owner is playing with the other dog or cat. This really hurts my feelings. Seeing MY owner play with someone else. It is all about me... they really don't understand.

Won't let me eat out of the litter box. I think of it as an opportunity for a tootsie roll snack. My owners get all grossed out, run around & then actually deny me access to what I desire the most. I am actually helping to clean up. What's the problem?

Expecting me to be at their beck and call. For a treat – I have to do some humiliating little trick & pretend I like it. What about independence, freedom & respect?

Rolling up the car windows. I feel such joy from the little words 'want a ride'? This gives me thoughts of having the window down with cool wind blowing through my hair, looking just dynamite as other dogs stare from the curbs in envy & awe. Just when I am really getting into it – head out, ears flapping, they roll up the window. Then I am forced to stare at other dogs going by with their heads out the window. Mega bummer.

Tips for Obedience Training

Luring & rewarding

Thanks to Judy Perrin

Are you one of those handlers who constantly feeds your dog during class? If so, liken this over indulgence to YOUR every day occupation!

Are you paid for every hour of the day or only for the hours you work? SO - your dog should be rewarded for the work HE does - no work completed - no reward.

<u>Behaviour rewarded will be repeated</u> & once you have enabled your dog to understand this concept by only rewarding AT THE RIGHT TIME & then by rewarding appropriately - you are well on the way to becoming a good trainer.

LURING is used to **shape a behaviour** which is unknown to the dog eg put a food treat to his nose, draw it over his head & very close to his head, to lure him into a 'sit'. As his bottom hits the ground give him the treat. Now add the verbal cue 'sit' as you take the food from his nose over his head. Once he understands what you are asking of him, luring is no longer needed. NOW change to Rewarding.

Luring can help develop a good relationship between dog & handler whilst assisting in guiding/shaping the behaviour & minimising the stumbling blocks of confusion or fear.

REWARD - means 'thanks - I really like it when you do that'.

Ask the dog to sit by giving him the verbal cue 'sit'. As he does so, reward him with a food treat.

Remember - your dog's favourite reward may not be food - it may be a pink pig, a grubby ball or just a scratched chest! With this in mind it is now appropriate to introduce the **verbal cue** 'yes', which will mark the precise moment the behaviour happened, acting as a 'bridge' between that moment & the time you are able to deliver the treat, whatever that treat may be. The 'yes' ends the behaviour which must now be rewarded.

BRIBING - is an attempt to gain control of the dog by getting him to do something he chooses not to. NOT a preferred part of dog training but, used sparingly, it is an effective way to solve a dangerous or frustrating situation, eg the dog is charging round the garden with an expensive article of clothing. He may be willing to 'trade' it for a piece of cheese. In a training situation the handler, who does not show the dog the treat, asks the dog to

The dog fails to sit.

The handler produces the treat, shows it to the dog & again asks him to sit.

Dog sits & receives the treat.

perform a 'known' exercise eg "Sit".

He has now become a qualified extortionist!!!

In positive reinforcement training, timing is critical if rewarding is to be effective.

The reward should be given within 3 seconds of a desired behaviour or the dog may inadvertently perceive the reward as one given for another subsequent behaviour.

Timing is also important when defining the criteria for success.

A puppy may be given 10-15 seconds to process a request & comply whereas an older or more experienced dog may only be allowed 2 seconds.

To be effective, the intensity of the reward must match the degree of difficulty of the action. The degree of difficulty of an exercise will also depend on your dog's breed, his physical ability, temperament, desire to work on that particular exercise eg a Labrador can be expected to be more willing to retrieve than a Shar Pei. This being so, a retrieve by the Shar Pei

should be rewarded with a 'jackpot'.

Variety of rewards is important - high value rewards, intermittently, will bring high value work. If you rely on a tennis ball & verbal praise as your sole rewards what happens when your dog is 13, deaf & unable to chase a ball - or when you lose your voice or have an injured shoulder?!!! As an employee earning a fixed salary, how do you feel when your boss offers you & your partner a weekend in the Hunter Valley as a "thank you" for your excellent contribution to the business?

Says it all!

It's time to have a bit of fun!

Tips for Agility

The Sydney Royal Easter Show Thanks to Tracey Elder it's not all fairy floss & dagwood dogs!

When I was a little girl my Grandmother used to take me to the Royal Easter Show ... I loved it ... the pavilions with the cows &

the pigs & the horses ... the waffles & the ghost train.... So many things to see.

How strange that my clearest memory of those days at the Easter Show is of Butterfly dogs.

It's strange because the highlight of my year is still the Sydney Royal Easter Show ... but now I'm part of it in the company of my own Butterfly dog, Sergeant Pepper.

Sergeant Pepper is a Papillon (French for Butterfly) & together we are competitors in the Agility dog events at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. His companion is called Hamish.

Our day starts very early ... we're up before 5.00am. You have to be up & ready to head for the site where the 'Royal' is located. It is still dark when we reach the first check-in gate.

Get Connected & Canine Body Language Seminar

with Brenda Aloff, renowned American dog trainer & behavioural specialist

Central Coast Obedience & Dog Training Club & Northern Suburbs Dog Training Club joined forces to present this two day seminar to 125 participants each day.

Brenda's knowledge & enthusiasm was exceptional - talk about a motivational speaker! She had the audience in the palms of her very active hands, for the whole seminar. There was plenty of laughter & there was no chance of anyone nodding off!

Brenda spends a lot of her time working with difficult dogs, rescued from shelters & other bad homes. She is amazingly adept at reading canine body language & being able to apply her calming techniques, thus getting the dog's attention & focus on her.

She believes the first thing we have to do is get the dog to switch out of the hind brain mode, which controls arousal & instinctive behaviour, into front brain mode where the dog starts to think before he acts & is thus able to learn new & acceptable behaviours.





Ben is normally an over-the-top dog.

He pulls, he jumps on people & has difficulty concentrating for more than a few seconds!

Under Brenda's guidance he calmed down & became a model dog!

He & Tracey have already spent many hours practising some of Brenda's exercises & it shows - wow! Tracey's back is a lot less sore these days.

Maggie is very shy.

Here she learns to focus on her owner & to trust her to 'make it all OK'. Mum knows best!

The Ku-ring-gai

All members & their dogs, in 3rd class or above, are encouraged to take part in the Ku-ring-gai K9 Award test.

Prior to being tested for the Award, you will need to study the information contained in your green Club Handbook. All answers to the take-home questionnaire will be found in the Club Handbook.



Road Safety

The handler will open the car door, attach the lead & invite the dog to get out (if the dog is wearing a car harness, this must be unclipped & the dog told to wait **while** the lead is being attached)



The handler will then pick up a basket (supplied by the Club) & walk to a gate with the dog on lead, ask the dog to wait, open the gate & walk through (inviting the dog through with them). The handler will then close the gate behind them



Accepting a friendly stranger

The Tester will shake hands with the handler, then greet & pat the dog (not on the head). The dog should **not** jump on the Tester or shy away



The handler will walk a set course with the dog on their left side.
Sits, downs & stands will be included. The dog is to walk without pulling





Sit or down stay

The handler will leave the dog in a sit or down position, move 5 metres away & wait for 30 seconds before returning to the dog's side. The dog must stay in position until the handler has returned

All dogs in 3rd Class or above are capable of achieving the KK9 Award

K9 Award

Throughout the test exercises, handlers may use praise & encouragement.

Food & toys are not permitted during any of the exercises **except** during the recall, where a toy or food may be used as an incentive.

Grooming & vet check

The handler will groom the dog. The Tester will check ears, eyes, teeth, tail & feet.


The dog should show no sign of stress or shy away





Release & recall

The dog will be released in an enclosed area with other friendly 'off lead' dogs. After 1 minute the handler will call the dog to return. The dog must return promptly to the handler



The handler, with the dog on lead, will walk through a crowd including 1 person with a dog, 1 person with an umbrella (which will be opened & closed), 1 person sitting & 1 person on a bicycle.

The dog should not jump on anyone in the 'crowd' or show stress





Next test day is Saturday 2 May 2009 See Bron Maurer to book your test time

Supervised separation

The Tester will ask the handler if they can hold the dog. The handler will hand over the lead & walk out of sight. The Tester will examine the dog's ID tags. After 1 minute the handler will return. The dog does not have to stay in one position, but **may not** continually whine, bark or pull on the lead. The Tester may talk to the dog but should not engage in excessive talking, patting or management attempts. This exercise demonstrates that the dog can be left with a friendly person & will maintain good training & good manners

Linda Tellington-Jones developed the Tellington TTouch Method. She first used it in 1983 with horses & has since adapted it for smaller animals - domesticated & wild.

It is used by dog owners, trainers, breeders, veterinarians & in animal shelters world wide. Using a combination of specific TTouches, Leading Exercises & the Confidence Course a dog's performance & health are improved, common behaviour issues are solved & physical problems are positively influenced.

It can assist a dog to recover from serious illness or injury & will generally enhance the quality of the animal's life.

Zac quickly relaxed & was happy to accept Andy's hand on him.

He responded by gazing up at Andy's face & asking for more, (much more please!) when she stopped.

> Zac normally does not like staying still for long!!





TTouches can be used to help a dog overcome their fear of thunder storms, fear of strange places & noises & fear of certain people.

It also helps dogs who are nervous, suffer from separation anxiety, are hyperactive or show aggressive behaviour.

Old dogs who suffer from stiffness & arthritis often get marked relief from TTouches.

You can borrow some of Linda's books from the NSDTC library.

Andy is showing Kay how to hold the lead for the Balance Leash Exercise. This exercise aids in correcting the dog that pulls on the leash.

The lead has 3 points of contact with the dog - their normal collar, the head halter & across the front of their chest.

A Healthy Dog is a Happy Dog

Fleas -they just love warm, humid weather!!

Every dog will occasionally have a flea/s on them. Please check your dog daily & protect them against fleas with the flea treatment recommended by your vet.

Paralysis ticks

Ticks are active all year round in the Sydney area. Check your dog daily - don't just rely on whatever tick prevention medication you are using.

Remove any tick immediately & closely observe your dog for the next 48 hours. If they show any of the early signs of tick paralysis (wobbliness, a change in bark, breathing difficulty or lethargy &/or a decreased appetite/vomiting) get them to the vet immediately.

Ear problems

High humidity increases the chance of ear irritations & infections.

Signs of ear problems are:

scratching at the ears shaking the head having a thick, black, waxy discharge

foul odour or discharge swollen ear flap redness or inflammation

If you dog has any of the above - they need to see the vet urgently.

Easter time & dogs

Please ensure your dog does **NOT eat chocolate.** This means dark, semi-dark, milk, white & cooking chocolate & anything iced with, covered in or containing chocolate/cocoa. Chocolate & the artificial sweetener Xylitol are highly toxic & can be fatal.

KK9/Handbook Sub-committee

A new Questionnaire is being complied for 2009, as the program no longer has lectures. All answers to the questionnaire can be found in the new Green Handbook.

General Business:

NSDTC Vaccination Policy

- NSDTC Inc requires a **minimum C3** (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination <u>after the age of 12 weeks</u> for all puppies **less** than **12** months old.
- All dogs joining or renewing that are 12 months to 3 years of age must have had at least a C3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months.
- Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 3 years who have not had a C3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months must be referred to the Club Veterinary Officer or nominee with their most recent vaccination certificate or letter of exemption from their vet.
- As Bordetella and Parainfluenza are not **normally** life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations are optional but **recommended** and owners are reminded that these will be required if the dog is to be boarded in kennels.
- All vaccination certificates must be signed by a registered veterinary surgeon.
- Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.

REMEMBER. A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccination is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.

PARKING

- Parking for Club Members who are **not** instructing or doing other club related duties is to the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground.
- The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for "on duty" Club Members who need to leave their dogs, carry equipment, etc.

CLUB & GROUND RULES

Please adhere to the following rules. They are for the benefit of all members & the general public who use St Ives Showground.
