# **Inappropriate Toileting**

Toileting in the house is one of the most common reasons dogs are excluded from the family home or worse still, surrendered to shelters. For this reason, it is perhaps the most urgent issue to teach when you first bring a puppy home. Prevention is the most successful method of training so right from day one, you need to be proactive to develop good toileting habits in your dog & prevent bad ones.

#### What's a 'toilet' to a dog?

Dogs choose a toileting spot based on several factors:

- Smell if it smells like a toilet it is a toilet. This is why prevention especially on soft materials, is so important. It is virtually impossible for a dog's nose NOT to be able to smell urine in carpet no matter how well you have cleaned an area.
- Surface a puppy or dog arrives at your home with a surface preference. This may be
  concrete (if they are used to being kennelled), paper, soft cloths (in a pet shop pen) or grass
  (if you're lucky!). It is difficult for a dog to learn they must not pee on the tiles in the family
  room but they may pee on the tiles on the back porch. The toileting surface should be
  different from any in the home.
- If the dog has been brought up in a good, sanitary environment he should prefer to toilet away from food, water & bedding. However for a dog who was not raised in ideal conditions, this may not be the case.
- As well as the above, the toilet is anywhere where the puppy has been 'rewarded' for peeing by relieving his bladder. Nature provides this 'reward', punishment will not eliminate it.
- Dogs may also eliminate to scent mark their territory. This behaviour is most often but not
  exclusively seen in entire male dogs. Usually there is a small amount of urine & it is placed
  up against a surface such as a curtain, chair or bedding or over another dog's food bowl or
  bedding. This is not a housetraining issue & needs to be dealt with separately.

Toileting problems are seen more often in small dogs which may be because:

- A greater percentage of small dogs than large dogs are allowed in the home therefore a
  greater percentage have toileting problems.
- Small dog puppies are often kept indoors on soft bedding & soiling areas creating a surface preference for soft, absorbent materials as opposed to grass.
- Small dogs being lower to the ground are more likely to dislike cold wet grass.
- Small dog/puppy accidents are less easily detected so favourite toileting spots may go unnoticed for some time reinforcing the spot as a suitable area by smell & practice.

#### Setting up for success.

Whether training a young puppy or retraining an older dog, the methods for developing good toileting habits are the same.

**Step 1.** The dog's free area must be restricted. Unless you are actively playing or supervising your dog or puppy it should be confined in a small area. This is so that you are better able to supervise your dog, prevent mistakes, time toilet stops & have the opportunity to reward desired behaviour – toileting outside.

Ideally, the area should be for short periods only, you will be taking the dog out at frequent intervals to toilet. The dog may be tied to your waist by a lead or contained in a crate. The crate should contain:

- A comfortable sleeping area
- Suitable chew toys

If your dog needs to be confined for longer periods of time (over 2 hours) the area must also include:

- A clean bowl of water
- A toileting area (ideally a piece of turf) if your chosen toileting area is your back yard lawn.
   Using a piece of turf in preference to paper as the toileting area cuts out 'the middle man' in your dog's education making it easier from the start for your puppy to understand that grass is the preferred surface.

**Step 2**:- Take your dog or puppy out to the designated area of your garden after every play, sleep, meal or drink – on average every hour. Say your special word that will eventually tell your dog to eliminate such as 'hurry up' & wait . When your puppy squats praise & reward him with several food treats. Make a really big fuss – this is great stuff. Your puppy may wonder why you think a natural function is so amazing but pay him big time & he'll be happy to oblige you quickly & consistently.

**Step 3**:-Repeat! Your puppy will need a long 'reward history' before he makes the connection that toileting outside is a consistently good thing to do. Outside is now providing three rewards – an empty bladder, a food treat & a happy owner. At the same time, mistakes have been prevented & the carpet is not sending fumes of 'toilet here' every time puppy passes by.

#### **Common mistakes:**

- You forgot to go out with your puppy to reward him thereby providing less confirmation to your puppy that 'toileting outside is good!'
- You roused on your puppy when he was 'caught in the act' so now puppy is reluctant to 'wee' in front of you at all. Confused by being punished for a necessary bodily function, puppy now refuses to wee in front of you, preferring to hide & pee behind the couch or under the bed creating lots of scented toileting areas for the future. It's easy to see how easily a cycle of mistakes can lead to long term, entrenched toileting problem.

The only solution is prevention & reward for correct behaviour. If your dog eliminates in front of you it is a *good thing* – he's halfway there! Now all you have to do is teach him that peeing in the house leads to a *gentle* interruption of 'oops outside quickly', while peeing outside leads to an empty bladder, food treats & a happy, praising owner. A dog who is happy to oblige when outside, is a dog whose toileting habits are under your control. You can now toilet your dog before bed, a trip or a walk. You know when he has 'been' so you are safe to leave him alone for a while creating great peace of mind.

## **Heartworm (Dirofilaria immitis)**

Heartworm disease is a silent killer of dogs & cats. Its onset is slow & insidious. There are few tell tale signs until the disease is well advanced. By the time you notice the telltale signs, the damage that has been caused is serious. This is one disease that can be totally prevented.

## Common signs of infection are

- chronic cough
- weight loss
- reduced exercise tolerance
- decreased appetite

**Prevention** is always better than cure There are four treatment options


- monthly chewables or tablets
- ♦ monthly spot-on treatments
- ◆ annual injection
- daily tablets

Heartworm infection in your dog can be successfully treated by your vet, but permanent damage may have occurred to the heart, lungs & major blood vessels by the time the infection is diagnosed & treatment commenced.

## In summary

- ♦ Heartworm is a deadly parasitic disease that lives in your dog's heart
- ◆ This parasite is transmitted by mosquitoes
- ◆ Prevention is simple, cost-effective & easy
- It is important to adhere strictly to your dog's preventative program (talk to your vet)
- ◆ Dogs over 6 months that have never been protected against heartworm will need a blood test before commencing preventative treatment

## **Coprophagia** (or the canine habit humans don't want to mention!)

Doggy bad breath is one thing, but no-one wants to be greeted by a canine companion who is in the habit of eating poo (their own or that of another species of animal).

As unappealing as this habit may be, it's something that dogs do - so don't freak out & think your dog's gone crazy.

The only circumstance in which coprophagia is considered a normal behaviour is when a mother dog (bitch) eats the faeces of her pups from the time of their birth until about 3 weeks of age. It is felt that the bitch does this to keep the nest area clean until the pups are able to move away from it to defaecate. It is also thought that a clean nest area may be less likely to attract predators in the wild.

It may also be considered a natural, although not normal, behaviour for dogs to consume the faeces of large herbivores (cows, sheep, goats etc.) containing significant amounts of nutrients remaining after large intestinal fermentation. This may have helped to sustain dogs in the wild when no other food source was available.

If no veterinary problem is found to be the cause, it is then theorised it is a behavioural problem. The most common behavioural causes listed in the literature were

- Cleaning of the nest area
- Responding to punishment from the owner for defecating in inappropriate locations by removing the evidence & imitating the owner's behaviour of removing faeces
- Stressful conditions such as sudden changes in lifestyle or environment
- The dog that is fed once a day may be supplementing their diet or finding things to relieve boredom!
- It can be yummy for the dog

## Suggested 'cures' to stop poo-eating

- Put a muzzle on your dog when free in the garden
- Add a deterrent to the dog's food (unsweetened pineapple juice or Chlorophyll tablets appear to be the most successful deterrents)
- Pick up faeces regularly, so there will be none to eat! Teach your cat to use a litter tray.
- Positive reinforcement: Substitute another behaviour that <u>can</u> be rewarded. When the
  dog is about to begin eating poo, use a command such as 'leave it', 'come', 'sit', etc &
  reward <u>this</u> behaviour. If this method is carried out diligently & regularly the dog will
  learn to come to you for a reward instead of eating poo. Hopefully over time, the
  coprophagic habit will be forgotten.

## **Soft toys can be dangerous** (from The Bernese Mountain Dog Website)

At agility class, a vet, who is a fellow agility student was telling us about a case she had this week. The dog had eaten a child's teddy bear & was very sick. When she operated on the dog up to remove what she thought was an intestinal obstruction she found a huge gelatine type mess inside & the dog's intestines were black & the tissue dead. The dog will die, no surgery can fix him up, there was no living intestine left from stomach to colon.

This was not an obstruction..... so Teddy Bear became the suspect.

So began a quest to find out what the gel was & what killed the dog. It turns out the stuffing in some toys contains ingredients for flame retardance & mite control! It is designed to become a gel & is highly toxic. Now you would think a child's toy would be safe because it is for children, but they don't expect a child to eat the stuffing of the toys... huummmm that seems a bit scary too. But we all know dogs demolish stuffed toys.

So do not give or buy your dog any children's stuffed animals... some people get them at \$2 & Op shops etc. Maybe some children's toys do not have this ingredient, but better to be safe than sorry.

So meanwhile, make sure all your dog toys are for dogs. Please pass this on... it is a horrible death she described & one that can be avoided.

# **National Agility Trails, Perth 2010**

Dawn Howell with 'Whist', 'Capella' & 'Jedda' & myself with 'Quix' & 'Kelly', set out on Tuesday 6th April for our trip to the 'Nationals'.

A very well organized event & the most relaxed trial I have ever competed at. They raised a big red flag when courses were ready for walking. They had also divided competitors into groups (a), (b) & sometimes even (c), to walk the course

'Quix' did well & Qualified in Novice Gamblers & Novice Snooker. He also got a Quallie in JDX, & being 4th in the 500mm group consequently qualified for the Finals – very scary but exciting.





The trip home was pretty hectic as Dawn had a deadline. However we had a full day at Fraser Range Station, 80 km east of Norseman, with a sunset tour of the property. A peaceful place where the dogs could run free up a big hill. From the top of the hill was a wonderful view of the property.

## **NSDTC Inc VACCINATION POLICY**

- We require a **minimum C3** (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination <u>after the age of 12 weeks</u> for all puppies **less** than **12** months old.
- All dogs joining or renewing that are 12 months to 3 years of age must have had at least a C3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months.
- Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 3 years who have not had a C3 vaccination in the preceding 12 months must be referred to the Club Veterinary Officer or nominee with their most recent vaccination certificate or letter of exemption from their vet.
- As Bordetella and Parainfluenza are not **normally** life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations are optional but **recommended** and owners are reminded that these will be required if the dog is to be boarded in kennels.
- Vaccination certificates **must be signed** by a registered veterinary surgeon.
- Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.

PLEASE NOTE: A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccination is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.

## **PARKING**

- Parking for Club Members who are <u>not</u> instructing or doing other club related duties is to the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground.
- The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for "on duty" Club Members who need to leave their dogs, carry equipment, etc.
