Puppy Life

Always reward success!

Use your voice & cuddles & treats

Reward based training produces a happy dog who really wants to work with you.

Rewards come in many guises such as voice, pats & cuddles, food & toys.

If your boss paid you peanuts instead of \$'s, you'd tell them to go jump in the lake & find a new job with a more realistic boss, wouldn't you?

Puppies behave in a similar way when you don't pay them properly for working well.

- They stop listening to you & no longer pay attention
- They start looking around for something more interesting to do
- They put their nose down & start sniffing the ground or pick up a stick to chew on
- . They move away from you & start to pull on the lead, etc

So how can you 'pay' your pup appropriately?

Your voice is one of the best treats you can give your pup. A happy, enthusiastic 'yes' can instantly mark the moment when your pup did the right thing. This must always be followed by a treat in the early stages of training & whenever you are teaching them something new.

Once the pup knows the exercise, you can reward with the 'yes' every time they do it correctly & randomise the giving of treats (remember a particularly good response can also earn a jackpot!). All types of reward must be given within 3 seconds of the wanted behaviour occurring or the pup doesn't know what they are being rewarded for.

Constant repetition of a word will result in the pup tuning out. For example don't keep saying 'sit', use your hands to show what you want or a treat to lure them into position.

Choose what your pup considers high value treat foods. Try all of the following -

cooked beef sausages, left over lean lamb or beef, cheese, salami, cabanossi, BBQ chicken or soft commercial treats such as chicken balls. Have a mixture ready in your pocket or a treat bag.

Food treats should be soft & tiny , really tiny - no bigger than your little finger nail.

You can reward your pup with 2-3 treats of this size & wow! they've hit the jackpot.

Talking of jackpots - if your pup does something really well, stop & reward them with your voice & your hands & feed 5-6 treats in quick succession. Attach the word 'jackpot' to this performance - your pup will soon learn the meaning of the word!

Avoid using hard treats such as kibble or dried liver or jerky, as puppies take too long to chew them & everything stops until 'I've finished this bit!' If they gulp the treat they can choke on it & remember if you feed them everyday kibble, it may be boring.

When you start training a puppy, we advise using lots of food treats. In the first few lessons you will have learned to use treats, your 'happy' voice & 'soft touch' hands to lure your puppy into doing the chosen exercise.

As you progress, you will stop luring, but always have tiny treats at the ready & give them generously. Later on you will start to randomise the giving of treats & intersperse it with your voice & pats/cuddles only, in other words you'll keep the pup guessing as to when the next food treat will appear!

Training Tips

See you later baby!

Or how to train a great recall.

For some dogs come means run away as far as you possibly can and if possible migrate to the next country, well the next dog park.

These dogs have learned coming back means we are going home and the end of the fun.

Of all the basic cues teaching a reliable recall is probably the most important and sometimes the most difficult one. Coming back under all circumstances and always has many benefits and can avoid real problems, such as being run over by a car, a confrontation with another dog, meeting a snake or just a kid that is scared of dogs.

Dogs do not come back because the world out there is very rewarding and the off-leash time is often the best part of the day!



But it is possible and very rewarding to teach your dog to come back if you stick to some basic rules:

• Teach your dog what come means: Take a piece of food or toy, show it to the dog and move backwards saying come, as soon as the dog catches up with you give him the treat/toy. You are associating the word come with moving towards you and being in a position close to you for the reward.

• When the dog eats the treat hold your dog gently on the collar. This is a safety measure to get your hands on your dog in an

emergency. You also don't want a 'drive by dog', a dog who comes, takes the treat and takes off again.

• Make it worthwhile for your dog: a really nice treat will do wonders a pat on the head on the other hand will not cut it.

• Manage the environment and prevent self reinforcing. This means using long leashes or fenced off areas.

• If you are in the dog park let them go again. Come should not mean we are going home. Call your dog every few minutes with a happy voice, give him a really nice treat or have a quick play but then let him go again. Reward when your dog is checking in with you. Never ever punish or rouse on a dog who came back (even after 2 hours). Your dog just told you that she

is not ready for that much freedom just yet.

• Do not ask for a sit at least not in the early stages. This can cause frustration and the dog may perceive the reward for sitting and not for coming.

• Use jackpots: Count out 5 to 10 treats and your dog will feel like Christmas. Do not give them a handful. For dogs one treat and a handful of treats is the same thing.


Chocolate at Easter isn't for our Furry Friends

Chocolate Toxicity Is Common

Like me, most dogs love chocolate. An Easter chocolate feeding frenzy usually makes me feel a little ill, but for dogs the consequences can be deadly. Unsurprisingly, Easter is the number one time of the year that vets see chocolate toxicity cases coming through the door. Thankfully, most cases are caught early enough for successful treatment. Also thankfully, chocolate scented vomit is the least offensive of all vomits! I can remember one particular dog I saw that had just eaten a jumbo bag of m&ms. When we induced vomiting it was like a warm, chocolatey rainbow... Chocolate is also toxic to cats, but they don't tend to go for it.

What Causes Chocolate Toxicity?

Chocolate, right? Well yes. But the type of chocolate is very important. The fat and sugar in chocolate can definitely cause a belly ache, or even pancreatitis. The main components that cause problems though are stimulants called methylxanthines, particularly theobromine. The darker the chocolate is, the higher the concentration of theobromine. This means baking chocolate is seriously dangerous to our pets. It's followed closely by dark chocolate, then milk chocolate, and finally white chocolate. Any food containing cocoa poses a risk, as this is where the theobromine comes from.



What To Do If Your Dog Has Eaten Some Chocolate?

The best option is to contact your vet immediately, or the local emergency vet if it's after hours. If you know approximately what your dog weighs and how much and what type of chocolate they have eaten, you will be able to get some advice over the phone. If you are advised to take your dog in, get there as soon as possible. If appropriate, the vet will induce emesis (vomiting) to remove as much chocolate from the stomach as possible. Medications may be given to help absorb any remaining chocolate in the gastrointestinal tract. If the chocolate was eaten too long ago and is already in your dog's system, they may need to be hospitalised and supported though it for a few days.

It is strongly recommend you do not attempt to induce emesis yourself at home. There is too much potential for things to go wrong.

Education Talks

Grooming our Furry Friends

On Wednesday 15th March 21 NSDTC members and instructors attended the 1st education evening of 2017. Ann & Julia from Annabelle's K9 Grooming kindly came down from Springwood for the club.

Some key points, thanks to the notes of our Education Committee chair person Sally, are:



Brushing & Combing:

- · Human bamboo brushes are recommended.
- · Removes foreign matter from coat.
- Takes out matted fur.
- · Health check for ticks, lumps and bumps etc.
- · Relationship building.
- It is essential to use the correct methods and correct equipment for your pet's coat.
- · Use long brush strokes right to end of tail.
- · Remove collar to brush neck area.
- · Brushing dogs ensures good air flow through coats for cooling.





Bathing:

- Tepid water only.
- · Chamois dries coats more effectively than towels
- Only use dog/pet appropriate shampoos, conditioners etc for correct pH levels.
- · Clippers only for tidying pads on feet.
- Use baby wipes for face.
- Use specialist nail clippers for claws and make sure dog is used to having feet handled.

Community News

Benny Waine is the Acting Companion Animal Management Officer for Ku-Ring-Gai Council. He will be a regular contributor to Yaps & Yelps to keep us up to date with what is happening in our area. First up Benny would like to make us aware of the new state wide Pet Registry. Please make sure your and your pet details are kept up to date on this register so if you are separated for whatever reason you can be reunited as quickly as possible.



How to register your cat or dog

You now have access to the NSW Pet Registry to register your pet, update your contact details, report your pet missing, transfer ownership and pay most lifetime registration fees from your computer or mabile device.

It's a requirement in NSW for all cats and dogs to be microchipped and placed on the NSW Pat Registry by the time two weach 15 weeks of age, or prior to sale, whichever comes first.

Therefore, your new pet should already be listed en the NSW Pet Registry with a microchip number under the previous owner's an breader's name. When you collect your pet, the breader or previous owner should transfer the pet to you on the registry by adding your teephone number or email address to the pet's microchip number.

You can then log in to the NSW Pet Registry, orsate a profile and 'daim' your pet by searching for the microenip number and your contact telephone number or email address.

Not microchipped?

Take your pet to your local set if it is not microchipped. They'll microchip if and articilis number to the NSW Pet Registry. You can thankag in to the registry, make a profile and "obim" your pet in the database by searching for the microchip number and your contact teephone number of email address.

Registration

Once you have created a profile you can pay your pets lifetime registration fees colline, which are doe by the time your pet is six months clid. You can also log back in at any time to keep your nonthact details and prefile split-cash, widely your ear or dog as messing, and transfer ownership. Up-to-clifts contact details give yourpet the best chanse of being returned homs if they are lost, stoler a injured.

If you need to, you can still register your pet, apdate your contact details, transfer ownership and pay registration fees by using forms at your local council.

Discount for desexed pets

The NOW Government continues to provide funding to support a decounted registration let to owners who desection cat before the age of four months, and dogs before the age of six months. Vate should update the registry when a pot is desected or if they believe apet should not be decened yet for medical reasons.

Already microchipped and registered?

If your pet is almostly registered you don't have to register again. To update your contact distails on to make sure they are correct, visit the NSW Pet Registry website, create a profile and "dam" your pet by stanching for the microchip number and the contact leverhone number or email address altached to the microchip number. Up-to-date regist alton decale give lost pets the best chance of being returned home.




Clubhouse Life

The Treat Jar

Mutt Balls

Ingredients:

- 500g minced chicken
- 150g breadcrumbs
- 1 tbs dried oregano
- 1 egg

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 180oC
- Mix all the ingredients together in a large bowl. Roll into 2.5cm balls and place on a greased tray or baking paper, your choice.
- Bake in preheated oven for 15-20 mins or until golden brown. Remove and cool.
- Store in an airtight container in the fridge. Alternatively, freeze them and use as required.

Makes about 50

TIPS..... Can be made with half breadcrumbs and half desiccated coconut. Also try them with dried mint.

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A Cuppa in the Clubhouse with...

Brenda, her greyhound Indy and friend Denise had a very exciting 2016 including gaining their Rally O Novice title. Brenda was kind enough to share her wonderful story with us at Yaps & Yelps.



Firstly let's start off with how did you and Indy come together?

Philip and I have been involved with Greyhound Adoption Program (NSW) Inc., since its inception in 1999, including fostering Greyhounds before they go to their forever homes. Indy is our fourth Greyhound from this group. Indy came to us as another foster dog in June 2011 and was company for our aged (and 3rd Greyhound) boy, Reuben. Indy was supposed to be a short-term foster for two weeks while her prospective owner was interstate. The adoption fell through. At the time Philip was having radiotherapy treatment for prostate cancer. Indy was only 18 months old and as cute as a button. While I rationally explained to Philip why it was not a good time to take on another dog, Philip voted to adopt Indy as she made him laugh.

I understand you share the training and trialling of Indy with Denise. How do you know Denise?

I met Denise while walking through St Ives Showgrounds shortly after moving to Sydney. We adopted our first Greyhound (Fran) from Denise that year. Denise is the President of the Greyhound Adoption Program (NSW) Inc. Their purpose is to educate the public on the benefits and care of Greyhounds as companion animals, and to find permanent, loving homes for these beautiful hounds. It is an independent charity and not associated with Greyhound Racing.

When did you join NSDTC? What bought you to NSDTC?

Shortly after I adopted Fran in 1998, Denise encouraged me to bring her to training at NSDTC. Fran was another Greyhound who could sit and eventually reached Second Class. Not a lot of Greyhounds will sit as it is uncomfortable for them. This position is not encouraged by their racing owners and trainers. I also trained our boy Reuben to First Class. I have been a member at NSDTC on and off for 19 years.

I hear Indy & Denise had a very successful 2016 picking up their Rally O Novice title. Tell me about how you got started in Rally O?

I was encouraged to bring Indy along to the Monday night Rally O classes when it was first introduced at NSDTC. I trained Indy to 3rd Class until I rescued a CKCS, "Darcy". Denise generously offered to keep training Indy for me so I could train young Darcy. Denise is a very experienced trainer, having trained and competed in obedience trails with her own Greyhound, Neige some years ago. Denise and Indy's very first Rally O Trial was here at NSDTC in January 2016 where they qualified and placed 3rd. I try to attend the trials with them as "support crew". Indy and Denise have gained their Rally O Novice title and require just one more qualification to gain their CCD.

What is it that you enjoy about Rally O? What is it that you think Indy enjoys?

As a former Dressage competitor in my vouth I could relate to the various exercises to be performed at the allocated stations. Having the co-ordination to read the sign; perform the move while controlling the dog is a skill and at times, a challenge. Indv can perform the exercises with more grace than me! Greyhounds have a mind of their own and need a good reason to obev commands. Indv enjoys Rally O training and the bbg chicken that goes with it. But she can be contrary in competitions where food is not allowed in the ring. Denise has worked very hard to cajole Indy through the Rally O and Obedience Trials



What would you tell someone who is thinking about trying Rally O? Maybe they have a dog that isn't considered a "working" dog? Come along and try it out.

Your dog might find it easier and more entertaining than just "obedience". The Monday night Rally O classes are very well organised and NSDTC is fortunate to have such experienced handlers and instructors who come and share their knowledge. It is a social group and everyone supports each other in their training.

Favourite thing/s about training at NSDTC?

It is a very inclusive club and has many highly experienced instructors and members who give their time willingly to help others. If you have a problem, all you have to do is ask.If that person doesn't know the answer they will find someone who will. Dog sports are a great leveller. Everyone, including the experienced instructors have "off days" with their dogs.

Any funny moments about life with Indy or training at NSDTC?



Too many! As a Greyhound, Indy will choose whether she will participate - or not. One trial at Castle Hill, she was going very well in the CCD ring until the recall. When Denise took up her position and called Indy to her – Indy ran straight toward her and kept going - she continued out of the ring to the roast chicken in the plastic bag on the seat next to me. I was taking photos at the time and couldn't believe what I was seeing through the lens.

 All dogs must be FULLY IMMUNISED (Veterinary Certificate required plus 2 weeks from date of last vaccination). Please read NSDTC Vaccination Policy on the next page.

- Junior Members are 12 to 15 years of age.
- Training equipment (leads, training collars, etc) can be purchased at the Clubhouse.
- Before starting Agility dogs must be at least 1 year old & in Third Class or above. New memberships for Agility can only be accepted on Saturday afternoons.

Membership Fees:

- 1 June to 31 October \$120
- 1 November to 31 January \$80
- 1 February to 31 May \$60
- If training more than one dog \$20.00 extra per annum for second dog, third or more free

NSDTC Inc Vaccination Policy Up-dated September 2010

NSDTC requires a minimum C3 (distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus) vaccination administered after the age of 12 weeks for all puppies less than 12 months old.

Please Note. A delay of two weeks after the final puppy vaccinations is required before puppies are permitted to join classes.

All adult dogs (over 12 months old) joining or renewing, must have had at least a C3 vaccination administered after 12 months of age. Triennial (3-yearly)

C3 vaccination is considered acceptable thereafter.

Dogs joining or renewing over the age of 4 years that have not had a C3 vaccination in the preceding 3 years must be referred to the Club Vet officer or official nominee.

Veterinary certificates showing adequate antibody titres* to distemper, hepatitis & parvovirus will be accepted by NSDTC for all adult dogs as long as they are dated within the preceding 12 months.

*Adequate antibody titres for distemper, hepatitis & parvovirus are considered to be > 1:20

As Bordetella & Parainfluenza (both agents causing canine cough) are not generally life threatening to healthy dogs, these vaccinations would be optional, but recommended & owners are reminded these may be required by boarding kennels.

All vaccination & antibody titre certificates must be signed by a registered veterinary surgeon.

Homeopathic 'vaccinations' will not be accepted.

Parking

Please park on the LEFT of the road as you enter the showground or near the picnic area beside the Douglas Pickering Pavilion.

The parking area on the right, nearer the Clubhouse, is for 'on duty' Club Members who need to leave their dogs in the car, carry equipment, etc. Thank you.

Club & Use of Grounds Guidelines

 \cdot All dogs must be on lead during club training times (except when off lead work is directed by an instructor during class).
